
Chic city garden





Varying elevations provide entertaining, dining and cooking areas, while keeping open sight lines for the whole garden.


















he picture is reality for two Toronto homeowners, who envisioned a minimalist, Japanese-themed garden with water and rocks. Their garden is not about a large expanse, but clever ideas for maximizing available space. An online search led them to Landscape Ontario, and Neil Obach, an old aquaintance. Obach and his team operate Jacob's Gardenscape, a Canada Blooms award-winning garden builder.

"Any garden space has potential," said Obach, "so as soon as I saw the backyard, I knew we could transform it into a beautiful garden and an outdoor space for the homeowners to enjoy."

"Neil made sure the basic elements we wanted were part of his design and rejuvenation," said the homeowner. "We wanted a water element but didn't want the hassle of maintaining and cleaning a pond, which was there when we moved in. Neil suggested a bubbling rock, something we had not considered. We also wanted a low maintenance garden and Jacob's Gardenscape was able to pull all the elements together for us."

A space of contemplation and contentment for all.








Because of the tight space and limited planting area, gabion panels were installed to provide a bit of privacy ... and a lot of appeal!





The gabion panels also serve as front-yard focal points.



The contractor felt the garden lacked a point of interest; it was just a plain garden. There was a patch of old turf grass and no attractive plants. Since the homeowners foster rescue dogs, easy maintenance was a necessary consideration.

Once a design was established, Jacob's Gardenscape happily accommodated minor adjustments, and with decisions on materials completed, Neil and his team came



in as scheduled, finished on time and under budget, and left the place cleaner than when they started. He also provided post-construction support and seasonal services, returning as needed for maintenance and replacing any plants that didn't thrive as nicely as expected.

For the homeowner, being teammates from years earlier provided an already established trust. But knowing Jacob's Gardenscape is part of Landscape Ontario, one of the largest green professional associations in North America, gave confidence the project would be completed to the highest standard.



Plant breeders never stop the quest for show-stopping blooms and enhanced performance, and gardeners love trying out new and improved selections. Your local independent garden centre is headquarters for new plants — keep this section handy for your spring shopping.

Enjoy this roundup of new plants for 2019!



The vigorous growth of this plant makes it a great choice for the landscape as well. In our trials it grew twice as large as Euphorbia Diamond Frost.



ANNUAL Hippo Pink polka dot plant The Hippo series is big and bushy with an upright habit,


suitable for use as a thriller or filler in containers and landscapes.



ANNUAL SolarPower Black Heart sweet potato vine

New heart-shaped leaf selections join the SolarPower series in 2019. Densely branched, it holds its shape and colour in the landscape and mixed combos all summer long.

This ornamental sweet potato vine has large heart-shaped leaves that maintain their dark purple (black) colour throughout the growing season. With its slightly mounding habit, it's a great annual ground cover for the landscape or "spiller" in mixed containers.



EDIBLE Primero Red habanero pepper

Primero Red is the earliest ripening habanero you can grow, with fruit ready to harvest and enjoy early in the season. Expect huge yields that are larger than other habaneros with just one-third the heat. Gardeners appreciate rich flavour in fresh salsa and cooking.

DOES IT PERFORM IN ONTARIO?


Two trial gardens in Guelph and Milton are great resources for helping Ontario gardeners succeed. Both gardens are managed by the University of Guelph, and reveal how new selections perform in real-life, southern Ontario conditions.

> Several of this spring's new cultivars were trialed; watch for the "Ontario Tested" logo, along with comments by trial garden manager Rodger Tschanz. Both gardens are open to the public. The Milton garden is at 7856 Fifth Line South, just east of Milton at the Landscape Ontario home office. In Guelph,

gardens are located at the entrance of the Guelph Turfgrass Institute at 328 Victoria Rd. S. Instagram users can see more trial garden info at #guelphtrialgarden.









SHRUB

Double Play Doozie spirea

Double Play Doozie is a hybrid that reblooms without deadheading. The hot pink-red flowers are very colourful, as is the vibrant red new growth.

ANNUAL First Flame Purple woolflower

First Flame has brightly-coloured blooms two weeks earlier than other celosias, according to its breeder. Well-suited for borders and containers. Purple is a unique colour to this type of celosia.

The dark purple plumes contrast well with the green foliage and seemed to maintain their colour throughout the growing season without fading.

ANNUAL

Gypsy White Improved low baby's breath

Gypsy White Improved produces many large, semidouble blossoms with improved branching and a better growth habit than other Gypsophila selections. It is well suited for containers, small spaces and garden beds.

Its peak performance period seemed to occur in the spring and early summer. Non-invasive annual and 2018 All-America Selections National Flower Trial Winner.




Snackabelle Red sweet pepper

Mini-bell pepper ripens from green to deep rec Perfect eating at any stage of ripeness. Thick fruit walls and rich, sweet flavour make Snackabelle Red great for cooking or snacking. Seed cavity releases easily for quick cleaning.

This is truly a snack- or bite-sized sweet bell pepper. Suitable for both containers and ground beds and functions well as an ornamental food crop.







ANNUAL City Lights dahlia Dark-leafed garden dahlia pops with contrast, and its bold, bicolour blooms last all season long. Available in four colours.

This dark-purple leaved dahlia has a well-branched bushy habit and reaches heights of 40-50 cm. The purple bloom contrasts well with the foliage.

ANNUAL

ColorBlaze Golden Dreams coleus

This robust coleus grows vigorously to form a bushy mound of radiant gold foliage with red venation. Like all ColorBlaze varieties, it performs well in both sun and shade.

This was one of the favourite coleus entries last year, with a golden leaf overlaid by a pattern of dark venation. This plant was not seen to bloom in the 2018 trials — a desirable characteristic in coleus, since there is no detraction from the colourful foliage.



ANNUAL

Angelface Steel Blue summer snapdragon


Gardeners have a new colour option in Angelface Angelonia - this unique, silvery lavender shade pairs beautifully with the pastel pinks and silvers.

In the Guelph trials it combined incredibly well in mixed plantings with the pink coloured flowers of Gomphrena Truffula Pink.



EDIBLE

Butterbaby butternut squash
Produces an abundance of sweet, personal-size fruit with classic light tan skin colour. Fruit lasts many months after harvest. Vines will not take over your garden and Butterbaby is resistant to powdery mildew, improving your harvest of high-quality fruit.




The fruit of this butternut squash is small compared to others commonly found; a single serving for one or two people. The vine requires trellising in tight areas such as containers on a balcony.





Oso Easy Double Pink landscape rose

Excellent disease resistance and abundant, continuous blooms set this low mounded, ground covering rose apart. Ten or more pink double flowers are produced per stem, creating a mass of cheerful summer colour. Glossy dark green leaves add to its appeal.



SHRUB

Tuff Stuff Ah-Ha mountain hydrangea

This beauty has dinner plate-sized blooms encircled with large, pastel, water lily-like double flowers of blue or pink. A strong rebloomer, Tuff Stuff Ah-Ha is nearly always in flower during the season. Zone 5.



Cadet Upright verbena Cadet Upright flowers one week earlier than

other upright verbenas, according to its breeder. This verbena features a compact patio pot or window box habit. Available in seven colours.



Magical Candle panicle hydrangea

Immense, porcelain-white flower heads appear backlit as if to create a surreal glow of soft, yellow flowers above tall, erect stems. A robust grower, the dense, lacy panicles of this hydrangea are among the most beautiful in its class. Growing four to five feet tall and wide, Magical Candle makes a great hedge or foundation plant. Zone 3.



PERENNIAL

'Burgundy Bunny' miniature fountain grass

Everything about this grass is small, including its short height, narrow green leaves and flower plumes. It has fiery red highlights in late spring, followed by buff coloured blooms in mid- to late-summer. In fall the foliage is a stunning red. Grows to a height and spread of 45. Exposure is full sun. Zone 5.

PERENNIAL Electric Sunshine tickseed

Electric Sunshine flowers beautifully from spring until late fall in a non-stop display of colour. Doesn't require cleaning or cutback to flower.







SHRUB ____ **Electric Love weigela**

Loaded with electric red flowers against dark foliage, Electric Love is the first weigela of its kind. Grows two feet tall and three to four feet wide. Zone 4.





PERENNIAL 'Cheese and Wine' reblooming daylily

With the colours of red wine and a variety of cheeses, this fragrant reblooming daylily provides colour over a long period during the summer. Grows to 75 cm. Best in sun or part sun. Zone 3.






PERENNIAL 'Younique Bicolor' garden phlox

These compact plants have loads of soft pink flowers with a white eye and bright pink specks. Earlier blooming than tall summer phlox, this selection will re-bloom if deadheaded. Mildew resistant. Best in sun. Grows to 40 cm. Zone 4.

This was voted one of the favourite container plants by visitors to the trial garden in 2018. The small double bloom held up well under conditions of heavy rain.





Moonrock panicle hydrangea

Creamy blooms emerge with an intense lime-green centre that's both funky and elegant. Grows four to six feet tall and wide with sturdy red stems. Zone 3.



ROSE Lotty's Love shrub rose

Lotty's Love is a cinnamon-scented rose with large, semi-double flowers that are a deep shade of mauve. The shrub is medium-sized with deep, glossy green foliage.



PERENNIAL

'Blue by You' meadow sage

'Blue by You' has excellent winter hardiness and heat tolerance. Will repeat bloom several times during the growing season when spent flowers are removed. It's a sterile hybrid for longer flower life. The plant is adorned with long, bright-blue flower spikes. Zone 4b.





SHRUB

Happy Face Hearts shrubby cinquefoil

A unique display of sweet pink flowers accentuated with a white star in the centre of each bloom. A healthy, dense plant that holds its flower colour well. Blooms from spring to fall. Zone 2.








SHRUB Titan English laurel

The foliage is handsome with bronze new shoots that keep their colour for a long period. White flowers appear in spring. It has a broad, upright and bushy growth habit, and grows to a height of 1.25 metres and a spread of one metre. Likes full sun to part shade. Zone 5.



49th Parallel Collection Chinook Sunrise shrub rose

Chinook Sunrise is the second addition to Vineland Innovation and Research Centre's 49th Parallel Collection of roses. This incredible rose blooms in a flush with a riot of exotic coral colours. It is a low-maintenance beauty featuring a 1.2-metre spread, black spot tolerance and winter hardiness across Canada.

PERENNIAL 'Boom Chocolatta' hardy geranium

'Boom Chocolatta' has rich, dark bronze leaves and an upright habit. Blue-purple flowers cover the top starting in early summer. It grows to a height of 70 cm and a spread of 75 cm. Exposure is full sun to part shade. Zone 4.







'Appleblossom Burst' pinks

'Appleblossom Burst' features semi-double flowers ranging from white to an intense pink blush. Best in sun and well-drained soil. Grows to 25 cm. Zone 4.



'Super Star' tickseed

'Super Star' boasts extra-large flowers to bring beauty to the perennial garden. Great in landscapes or use in containers for long-lasting texture and colour. Zone 5a.







Supertunia Vista Paradise petunia

Glowing watermelon-pink blossoms blanket the wide spreading foliage from spring through fall without deadheading.

This is a new colour and welcome addition to the Supertunia Vista series of petunias which includes the ever popular Vista Bubblegum. This series is known for its vigour and tolerance of a wide range of growing conditions.





The light green of this foliage and brilliant red bloom contrast nicely and really brighten up a shady section of the garden. Caution: Too much direct sun will cause the leaves to become pitted and stunted.



ANNUAL

Big EEZE Foxy Flamingo geranium Foxy Flamingo features the rounded habit of a zonal

geranium, but the heat tolerance of an ivy. With flamingo pink variegated flowers, Foxy Flamingo is a new addition to the Big EEZE series.



ANNUAL

Easy Breezy alyssum

Easy Breezy provides bright flowers that continuously bloom from early spring. It features a non-split habit.



SHRUB

Summer Crush bigleaf hydrangea

Summer Crush brings a profusion of rich raspberry red or neon purple blooms all summer long. This hydrangea has dark green glossy leaves, resists wilting in summer heat, and fits smaller garden spaces or containers. Grows to 45-92 cm tall and wide.



Night Rider 'Durby' Japanese elm

Night Rider is a hybrid between Japanese elm and Siberian elm that has rapid growth, upright, rounded crown form and is highly resistant to Dutch elm disease. It exhibits good cold hardiness and foliage turns purple in the fall. Night Rider is an excellent street tree since it tolerates the urban environment well. Mature height is 12 metres with a 10 metre spread. Zone 3.



ROSE

Suñorita shrub rose

Classic rose flowers start out orange and transform into rich hues of gold and yellow as they open and mature. This shrub has shown good continuous blooming and healthy glossy, dark green foliage.





TREE **Skinny Genes oak**

Columnar in form, Skinny Genes is the narrowest cultivar to date. It has glossy, very dark green foliage that turns yellow in fall. Use it as a visual screen or street tree. It grows to a height of 14 metres and a spread of 3 metres. Exposure is full sun. Zone 4.



PERENNIAL

Ka-Pow garden phlox

The Ka-Pow series offers excellent branching to ensure an abundance of flowers throughout the summer. This hardy garden phlox provides beautiful bouquets of flowers in four vibrant colours. Zone 4b.



that completely cover the plant in early spring. The flower buds are ultra cold-hardy and appear in full bloom to the tips of the branches during the coldest winters. Pink Frosting is an excellent choice for an informal hedge, mass planting and accent shrub, due to its robust spring display. Hardiness Zone 2b.

Berry White panicle hydrangea

Berry White's flowers emerge white fading to pink, then deepening in the fall to a red. This hydrangea has upright growth, with full branching. Zone 3.





SHRUB Fireside ninebark

This new ninebark has stunning foliage. Fireside's reddish new growth matures to deep red-purple foliage that holds its colour reliably all summer. Pinkish-white flowers bloom in spring and foliage turns deep purple in fall. This plant has a rounded. upright shape.











SHRUB /

Genie magnoliaBlack-red buds open to small tulip-shaped blooms of deep rich, maroon-purple with tips that fade to a lighter magentarose. Genie grows to a height of three to four metres and a spread of two metres. Exposure is full sun to part shade. Zone 5.





PERENNIAL

'Red Lightning' coral bellsElectrifying dark red veins spark over huge gold leaves.

Colour holds well throughout the season. This striking foliage works equally well in the garden or a mixed container. Best in part to full shade. Zone 4. Grows to 30 cm.



PERENNIAL

'Pure Heart' plantain lilyNamed after Mighty Mouse's girlfriend, this very compact

selection bears leaves with blue-green margins and a creamy yellow centre - the reverse of H. 'Mighty Mouse.' Best in part to full shade. Zone 3.





This New Guinea Impatiens is has a semi-double bloom and a relatively compact growth habit. In the trials, Wild Romance Red produced brilliant red blooms consistently throughout the summer.

ANNUAL

Wild Romance Red **New Guinea impatiens**

The Wild Romance series features flowers that resemble a rose as the bud is opening and a gardenia when fully open. Now, Wild Romance Red joins Blush Pink and White.

ANNUAL

SuperCal Premium petuniaThe SuperCal series of 13 petunias is joined by five

next-generation colours that feature larger flowers and a stronger mounding habit. New colours include Bordeaux, Caramel Yellow, Cinnamon, French Vanilla and Sunray Pink.







ROSE

Cherry Frost 'Overedclimb' climbing rose

Cherry Frost is a solid cane, Zone 4-hardy rose with beautiful clusters of smaller red blooms. It repeat-blooms throughout the season abundantly. It has superior disease resistance and performs well on its own roots.



ANNUAL Senator iQ wax begonia

This wax begonia has a uniform and compact plant habit and dark bronze foliage. Its large, bold blooms are well-suited for containers and mass landscape plantings. The series includes Deep Rose, Pink, Rose, Rose Bicolor, Scarlet and White.



PERENNIAL

'Mel's Blue' Stokes' aster

An upright selection with four-inch wide periwinkle blue blooms, held high and flat on strong stems. This Stokes' aster stands apart because of the large number of upright flowers it produces. Zone 5.





Bella Bellissima potentilla

An abundance of rich pink blooms from top to bottom of the tidy, compact form. Two to three feet tall and wide. Zone 2.

Corona produces large-size flowers on a compact, mounded plant. It offers the biggest blooms of any dianthus of this type with exceptional flower form, according its breeder.



to burgundy purple with a semi-gloss finish as summer progresses. Golden orange, daisy-like flowers top the plant on purple stems in mid-summer. Suited for use in borders, as a specimen or in woodland shade. Grows to a height of 1.25 metres and a spread of 1 metre. Zone 4.

golden bleeding heart 'White Gold' has brilliant-white, heart-shaped flowers and blooms in the early spring. This bright green-yellow perennial acts as a hummingbird attractor and can bring colour and light to any shade garden. Zone 4.



Making your landscape more water efficient with Fusion

What is Fusion landscaping?

Fusion landscaping is a style of landscape design, construction and maintenance that combines stunning colours and textures, with landscape elements that utilize potable water efficiently and manage rainwater where it falls.

What is a Fusion Landscape Professional?

A Fusion Landscape Professional (FLP) is an industry professional that has extensive training and experience, and is certified by Landscape Ontario Horticultural Trades Association. An FLP can design, build or maintain functional, beautiful landscapes that save water, manage stormwater and enhance livable space. This is done by focusing on reducing runoff, correcting drainage issues, and using water efficiently on your property. You can find a certified professional at www.fusionlandscapeprofessional.ca.

If you are not currently in the market for a new landscape, here are some tips to make your current landscape more water efficient:

Harvest Rainwater

An easy way to reduce the amount potable water applied to your gardens is to harvest the rainwater that falls on your roof. Installing a rain barrel at the outlet of your downspout is a simple way to collect rainwater, and utilize it to water your gardens as needed.

Choose the Right Plant for the Right Place

Selecting and matching your plant selections to local conditions can help them to thrive with minimal watering once they are established. Consider soil quality and make up, potential winter salt spray, drainage and sun exposure when choosing plants. It is encouraged that you choose either native plants or plants that are well adapted to our climate, that will not become invasive – this will minimize both maintenance and watering needs.

Water and Irrigate Efficiently

There are several ways to reduce watering requirements including, grouping plants according to their watering needs, mulching garden beds to retain moisture, and choosing drought tolerant plants when possible. If you have an irrigation system, it is recommended that it is assessed by a Water Smart Irrigation Professional to make sure the system is efficient as possible. Disconnect Downspouts

Consider disconnecting the downspouts on your house from the stormwater sewer system, and directing the water away from your foundation and into a well-draining lawn or garden instead. This will allow the large amount of water that lands on your roof to percolate into the ground. If your house is located on a tight residential lot, consider hiring an FLP to construct a Fusion element, such as a rain garden or bioswale, to infiltrate the rainwater.

Limit Impervious Areas

Hard surfaces such as roofs, driveways, and patios can take up a large percentage of the footprint of your property. All of the rainwater that falls on these surfaces will not infiltrate into the ground, and will create large volumes of polluted runoff after a heavy rain. Try to increase the amount of permeable surfaces on your property, through softscaping or using permeable hardscape surface options including, permeable pavers, porous concrete or gravel.

By implementing these changes, you can make your property more resilient to both extreme rainfall events and drought, while having a positive impact on the environment.

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
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
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
